They will also need to get a free PCR test to check if they have COVID-19. • Whilst awaiting the PCR result, the individual should continue to self-isolate. - If the PCR test is taken within 2 days of the positive rapid lateral flow test, and is negative, it overrides the rapid lateral flow test and they can return to the setting, as long as the individual doesn't have COVID-19 symptoms. 			In the event of a local outbreak, follow all local guidelines including avoiding closing where possible and responding to enquiries prevention The Operational Guidance sets out the measures that all education settings should have in place to manage transmission of COVID-19 day to day. For most settings it will make sense to think about taking extra action if the number of positive cases substantially increases. This is because it could indicate transmission is happening in the setting. The thresholds, detailed below, can be used by settings as an indication for when to seek public health advice if they are concerned.
